
THE HARLING AND GUILTCROSS BENEFICE



ADVENT RETREAT

17th – 23rd December 2024

This Advent, you are invited to join with others throughout the Benefice in prayer and reflection – but from home. At 7pm (if you are able), I invite you to sit somewhere quiet, light a candle, and use the simple form of prayer in this booklet. For each day of the retreat, a Psalm and a Reading from the Bible are given. There is also the opportunity to hear a reflection from the Ministry Team on the Antiphon for that day – simply go to youtube.com, search for the Harling and Guiltcross Benefice channel, and you will find the reflection each day.

Our prayer is that, as we draw close to the celebration of our Lord and Saviour being born among us, we will each have little moments of quiet and stillness to reflect on his coming among us; in the manger at Bethlehem, 2000 years ago; at the end of all things, when he shall return in glory; and in every single moment of our lives, as he seeks to be born within the lives of those he loves and calls to hope.

An antiphon is a short verse that is used like a refrain, either repeated at points through another text or to begin and end it. Antiphons are often used in Christian worship, for example, during the singing of psalms.

The 'O Antiphons' are the antiphons that are said or sung before and after the Magnificat on the seven days preceding Christmas Eve (17–23 December). They all begin 'O...' hence their name. They are known by their Latin titles, for example, 'O Sapientia...', is 'O Wisdom...'

The antiphons use texts from the Bible, both Old and New Testament, that Christians understand to refer to Jesus Christ, the coming Messiah. People who do not know the antiphons from Evening Prayer may well know them from the Advent hymn 'O come, O come, Emmanuel'.

THE O ANTIPHONS

17 December - O Sapientia

O Wisdom, coming forth from the mouth of the Most High, reaching from one end to the other mightily, and sweetly ordering all things:

Come and teach us the way of prudence. *cf Ecclesiasticus* 24.3; *Wisdom* 8.1

18 December - O Adonai

O Adonai, and leader of the House of Israel, who appeared to Moses in the fire of the burning bush and gave him the law on Sinai:

Come and redeem us with an outstretched arm. *cf Exodus 3.2*; 24.12

19 December - O Radix Jesse

O Root of Jesse, standing as a sign among the peoples; before you kings will shut their mouths, to you the nations will make their prayer: Come and deliver us, and delay no longer. *cf Isaiah* 11.10; 45.14; 52.15; *Romans* 15.12

20 December - O Clavis David

O Key of David and sceptre of the House of Israel; you open and no one can shut; you shut and no one can open:

Come and lead the prisoners from the prison house, those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death. *cf Isaiah* 22.22; 42.7

21 December - O Oriens

O Morning Star, splendour of light eternal and sun of righteousness: Come and enlighten those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death. *cf Malachi 4.2*

22 December - O Rex Gentium

O King of the nations, and their desire, the cornerstone making both one:

Come and save the human race, which you fashioned from clay. *cf Isaiah 28.16; Ephesians 2.14*

23 December - O Emmanuel

O Emmanuel, our King and our lawgiver, the hope of the nations and their Saviour: Come and save us, O Lord our God. *cf Isaiah 7.14*

Daily Prayer During Advent

PREPARATION

O God, make speed to save us.

O Lord, make haste to help us.

Your words have I hidden within my heart, that I should not sin against you.

PRAISE

Saviour eternal, life of the world unfailing, light everlasting and our true redemption.

Taking our humanity in your loving freedom, you rescued our lost earth and filled the world with joy.

By your first advent justify us, by your second, set us free: that when the great light dawns and you come as judge of all, we may be robed in immortality and ready, Lord, to follow in your footsteps blest, wherever they may lead.

Keep us, O Lord, while we tarry on this earth, in a serious seeking after you, and in an affectionate walking with you, every day of our lives; that when you come, we may be found not hiding our talent, nor serving the flesh, nor yet asleep with our lamp unfurnished, but waiting and longing for our Lord, our glorious God for ever. Amen.
